The close of summer and fall gives us our warmest weather of the year. It has been great to see our families with young children enjoying swimming and the paddle boarders using the water. Unfortunately it has been brought to my attention that some homeowners have been disposing their dog's waste in the same water. While it may seem a reasonable way to dispose of the waste, it is not. Even if there is assurance (which there is none) that the waste is removed with the tidal action, as with human waste, this is not the proper method of disposal.

The practice of throwing the pet waste into the water is bad for the environment and presents a host of potential health hazards to humans and pets. Dog waste carries disease-causing bacteria that can be transmitted directly to humans. Ringworm, roundworm, salmonella and giardia are examples of such bacteria, all of which is found in dog feces and are easily transferable upon contact.

Using our landscaping as a disposal site is also not an acceptable method of disposal. It is a misconception that a dog feces is a natural fertilizer. Cows and horses are herbivores, which make their waste ideal for use as fertilizer. Dogs, on the other hand, are carnivores making their byproducts unsuitable for soil enrichment.

Pet waste should always be picked up, bagged then placed in the garbage to be taken to the landfill. Double bagging is recommended to protect garbage collectors from coming into contact with the waste upon removal.

I want to thank everyone for their cooperation in keeping our water and common area clean. We all share the same "backyard" and with common courtesy from everyone it can be safe to enjoy.

3. Adjournment

Executive sessions of the board of directors are provided by statute so boards can address issues involving privileged information and matters of a private nature. As a result, members do not have a right to attend executive sessions. As provided for in Civil Code §4935, boards may go into executive session for the following matters:

- 1. <u>Legal Issues</u>. This preserves <u>attorney-client privilege</u>, litigation strategy and settlement strategies for current and potential litigation matters. The association's attorney does not need to be present either in person or by phone for the board to meet in executive session to discuss legal issues.
- 2. Formation of Contracts. Boards may consider matters relating to the formation of contracts with third parties.
- Disciplinary Hearings. Boards should meet in executive session for all <u>disciplinary hearings</u>. The accused member is entitled to attend the executive session for that portion of the meeting dealing with member's hearing.
- 4. <u>Personnel Issues</u>. Personnel matters which include, but are not limited to, hiring, firing, raises, disciplinary matters and performance reviews.
- Payment of Assessments. Board may meet with members in executive session to discuss requests by delinquent members for payment plans.
- 6. <u>Foreclosure</u>. The decision to initiate foreclosure shall be made only by the board of directors of the association and may not be delegated to an agent of the association. The board must approve the decision by a majority vote of the directors in executive session. <u>Civ. Code §5705(c)</u>.
